What is food studies?

Food studies is an umbrella term that includes foodways, gastronomy, and culinary history as well as historical, cultural, political, economic, and geographic examinations of food production and consumption, using food as a “lens” through which to view, explore, analyze, and interpret society in the present as well as in the past.

Degree Requirements

40-credit program

- Core, specialization, and elective course work

A 34-credit program is available for those who have completed the 6-month certificate program at the French Culinary Institute or Institute for Culinary Education in New York City.

Prerequisites

- E33.0085 Intro to Food Science (3 credits) or equivalent
- At least six months or 500 hours of full-time food-related work experience

Unfulfilled prerequisites may be completed during the master's program and must be taken in addition to the required M.A. credits.

Which concentration should I choose?

Food Culture examines the social, economic, culture, and psychological factors that have influenced food consumption practices and patterns in the past and present. Students research historical, sociological, and anthropological aspects of food.

Food Systems traces commodities and agricultural concerns from production through consumption. Students explore environmental, ethical, and economic factors in food production and distribution, with an emphasis on international, national, and local food systems.

- A completed, dated, and signed graduate admission application form
- Statement of Purpose/Personal Statement
- Résumé or Curriculum Vitae
- Official transcripts
- TOEFL scores for international applicants
- Application Fee
