By conducting independent student research under the supervision of a faculty member, you can explore a question or issue in depth and expand your understanding and knowledge of that topic. In the process, you will develop critical analytical skills, sharpen your ability to organize data and report both orally and in writing your research findings.

Matriculated **sophomores and juniors** in NYUSteinhardt with a 3.5 grade point average or better are invited to apply for a **Dean's Grant to Support Undergraduate Student Research**. Successful grant requests describe a faculty-sponsored independent research project, which is not connected with a course or in fulfillment of degree requirements. Your research must be conducted within the time period specified – for sophomores, during your junior year, and for juniors, during your senior year. You may apply for a grant individually or as part of a team. Past grant recipients are ineligible.

Proposed research

- Must be conducted between June 1, 2008 and February 1, 2009
- If it is research involving human subjects, it must adhere to NYU procedures for review and approval (see www.nyu.edu/ucaih/).

Grant recipients are expected to:

- Submit a written report by March 1, 2009, including the question under investigation, research methods used, results, conclusions, and how the monies from the Dean's Grant were used.
- Present their findings at the Dean's Grants to Support Student Research Colloquium in early March, Spring Semester 2009.

The Grant request itself should be no more than five double spaced pages. It should be stapled to the completed cover (see other side), and include the following:

- Abstract (one paragraph summary of your proposal, separate from the body of the proposal), including title.
- Question or problem under investigation
- Plan of work, i.e., methods you plan to use or research design, including where relevant, instruments and measure to be used, availability of research participants, and confirmation of access to them.
- Anticipated results
- A time schedule and itemized budget for how the grant will be used, which may include purchase of necessary equipment, travel to conferences or collections, computer time, or any other reasonable and justified expense.
- Significance of your project or the expected benefit of your research
- How this research opportunity will contribute to your career and professional development
- Certification that you have not conducted the proposed research prior to June 1, 2008.
