Federal Work Study (FWS) Students at NYU

What is Federal Work Study (aka College Work Study or Code 118)?

FWS is a federal program that grants funds to NYU to enhance part-time work opportunities for undergraduate and masters level students.




The funding allows NYU to assist students in financing the costs of postsecondary education through part time employment.



How does it work?

NYU receives a federal grant funding student work, which the central university reallocates among the schools, divisions and students.

Overall at Steinhardt we are awarded about \$200,000 of FWS monies.



A standard formula established by Congress is used to evaluate the financial information reported on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and to determine the expected family contribution.

The Office of Financial Aid makes an FWS award determination for students based upon financial need.

FWS Monies are GRANT Funds

- Thus they only can be used in the year awarded so use it or lose it.
- FWS year effectively runs 3rd week of August 3rd week of June.



What's in It for My Department?

- Show me the money!
- Using FWS results in a budget savings (\$10 = Feds \$7.50 + Steinhardt \$2.50)
- Budget summary report shows 25% of total cost
- FWS monies/saving ends
 - When the department runs out of FWS \$
 - After June 30th
 - If the student's FWS balance is zero

What's in it for the Student

- Some units' budgetary restrictions mean they need to hire only FWS eligible students.
- FWS is part of a student's overall financial aid package; therefore choosing a job that is not FWS may negatively impact the student's overall financial aid package



Student Options Once FWS \$ Is Spent

- FWS employment ends when student runs out of FWS \$ (balances equal to FWS eligible total student earnings can be seen on myTime)
- Request an increase in FWS from financial aid
- See if department can afford to hire as a non-FWS student hourly employee (119)

What's in it for the School?

- The Steinhardt share of the University's FWS grant funding depends in large part on our ability to successfully spend these monies.
- We would like to maximize the amount we receive and pass the savings on to you.
- Therefore, we need to know what barriers exist that prevent you, your faculty and researchers from hiring FWS eligible students.

How to...



How to – Describe a Job Opening and Post it


- How much work do you have for a student?
- How long do you think it would take the student to complete the work you have?
- Combine tasks to create the workload and determine how many hours per week you can use this student
- In the job description, list the skills needed and a brief description of your job; you can go over more details when you interview potential candidates.

Can FWS \$ be increased?

- Department notified of budget in August
 - Calculate amount needed per student (mere 25% of salary).
 - Increase need? What can be decreased elsewhere in budget?
 - Or, make strong case to Admin & Finance
 - The earlier in year, the better
- Student Awarded in annual financial aid
 - Files increase request with Financial Aid.
 - Reevaluated based upon
 - Student's overall financial situation
 - NYU FWS monies still available
- School vs Student allotment
 - Macro level = interrelated; micro level = operates independently

NYU restricts the amount of hours per week a student can work

20 Hours/week during the academic year regardless of the funding source



NYU restricts the amount of hours per week a student can work

- 20 hours/week limit
- Hours can be divided between more than one job
- America Reads always pays on code 118
 - Becomes primary FWS appointment = 1st dibs on these funds

 Be mindful of exam schedules, winter break, spring break, etc. to ensure you and your department have the coverage you need. Use the Wasserman Center for Career Development web site's link to its form to you post your job listing on NYU CareerNet

How to – Decide on the right Rate of Pay per Hour

All jobs are required to pay at least the established federal minimum wage, though some will pay more. The actual pay rate will vary with the type of job (clerical versus technical, etc.).



How to – Gather and Submit the Paperwork for Hiring

Forms forms forms...

- Wasserman's On-Campus Student Application Form (http://www.nyu.edu/careerdevelopment/forms.php)
- Steinhardt Forms
 (http://steinhardt.nyu.edu/adminfinance/forms)
 - Personal Data Form
 - Original Notice of Pay Rate and Payday
 - External Funding Form (if paid from a grant)
- Memo with hiring information

Is the Applicant FWS Eligible?

- The student brings to the interview the On Campus Student Employee Application
 Form. It indicates:
 - FWS eligibility
 - Award amount
- Award amount
 - Need based
 - Base award \$3,000/yr.
 - + \$ increased/decreased depending on income level

Memo with Hiring Info:

- Start date
- Rate \$/hour
- Hours per week
- Chartfield account number to be charged
- Designated myTime approver

Student's first bi-weekly paycheck – 1-2 weeks depending on:

- Timing of appointment w/n pay cycle
- Submission of myTime by student
